In other words, the quantitative value is the same but the qualitative value in terms of number of experiences is not. Dues would have to increase to maintain sorority/fraternity group members' level of satisfaction, and I am not sure if that increased price tag would be worth membership. The field of psychology coined the concept of "justification of effort." This is the tendency for individuals to increase their liking for something they have worked hard to attain. The more effort we put into becoming members of a group, i.e. going through the greek recruitment process, the more we will like the group we have just joined. There are numerous studies that elaborate on the benefits of belonging to a group we like, including increased engagement, increased productivity, and increased subjective well being. It would be a shame for Emory University to squander the positive outcomes by neglecting the value of sorority/fraternity membership - quantitative and qualitative - and the implications of such.

We don't have a football team, we don't have tailgates, we don't have a bar scene. The university had systemically squelched much of what makes college fun, and people are noticing. As a sophomore, I personally know more than a handful of people who transferred during or after their freshman year because they weren't having fun here. I understand and appreciate that this is an institution that emphasizes academics, but school is hard, and people want a release from that. When the university creates an environment that oppresses people's ability to have fun, stress mounts and moods sour, and it affects not only current but prospective students as well. If a student visits Emory on a Friday night and nothing is going on because half the frats are on social probation and the other half are scared shitless of throwing an unregistered event for fear of getting put on social probation, why on earth would that person come here? The system of Greek life ultimately shows how fragile "masculinity" is, and it perpetuates gender inequality and female subordination. Not to mention it is full of young people exploiting their white privilege to create yet another rigid social hierarchy in which they can feel powerful and worthy and elite, at the detriment of those who do not fit the mold. Also, it creates separation and disunity within the student body, as those involved in Greek life usually do not socialize with those who are not involved. I personally think fraternities and sororities are just stupid, and they create a fake, temporary social life for those who adhere to it. Usually, these adherents are not industrious or socially skilled enough to jump-start a healthy social life on their own, so they resort to paying a substantial amount of money to a frat or sorority so that one can be jump-started for them. Hence, these adherents are essentially paying for their friends, because they likely would have never met these so-called "friends" had it not been for paying money to join the community.
